## SERVICES REPORT – May 2022

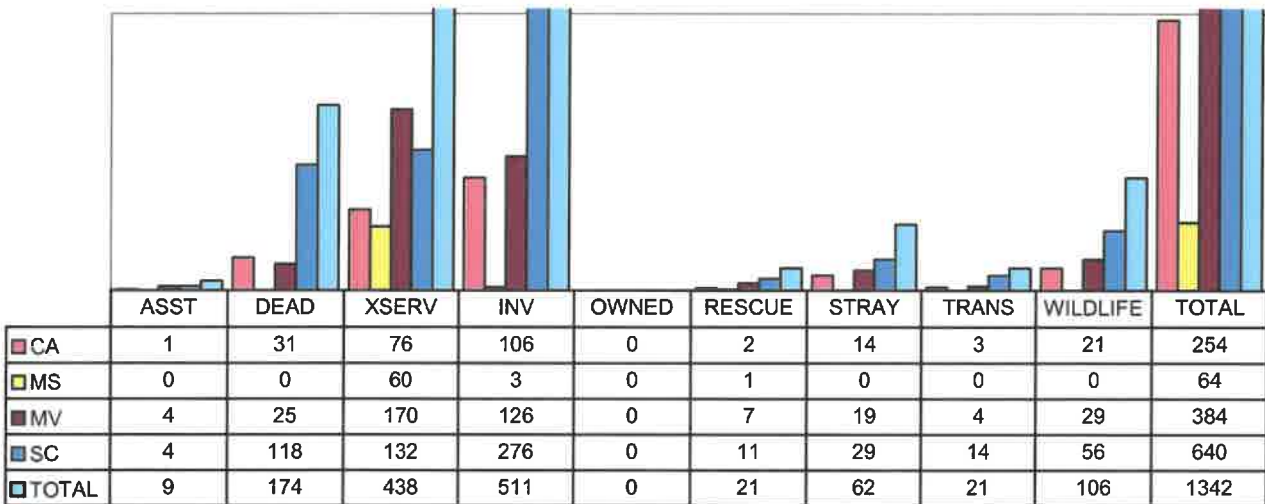
### Introduction

This report provides graphs, tables and explanatory narratives covering five categories of information: field service calls, violations and citations issued, animals impounded, animals licensed, and animal outcomes. SVACA’s fiscal year is July 1 – June 30.

### 1. Field Service Calls

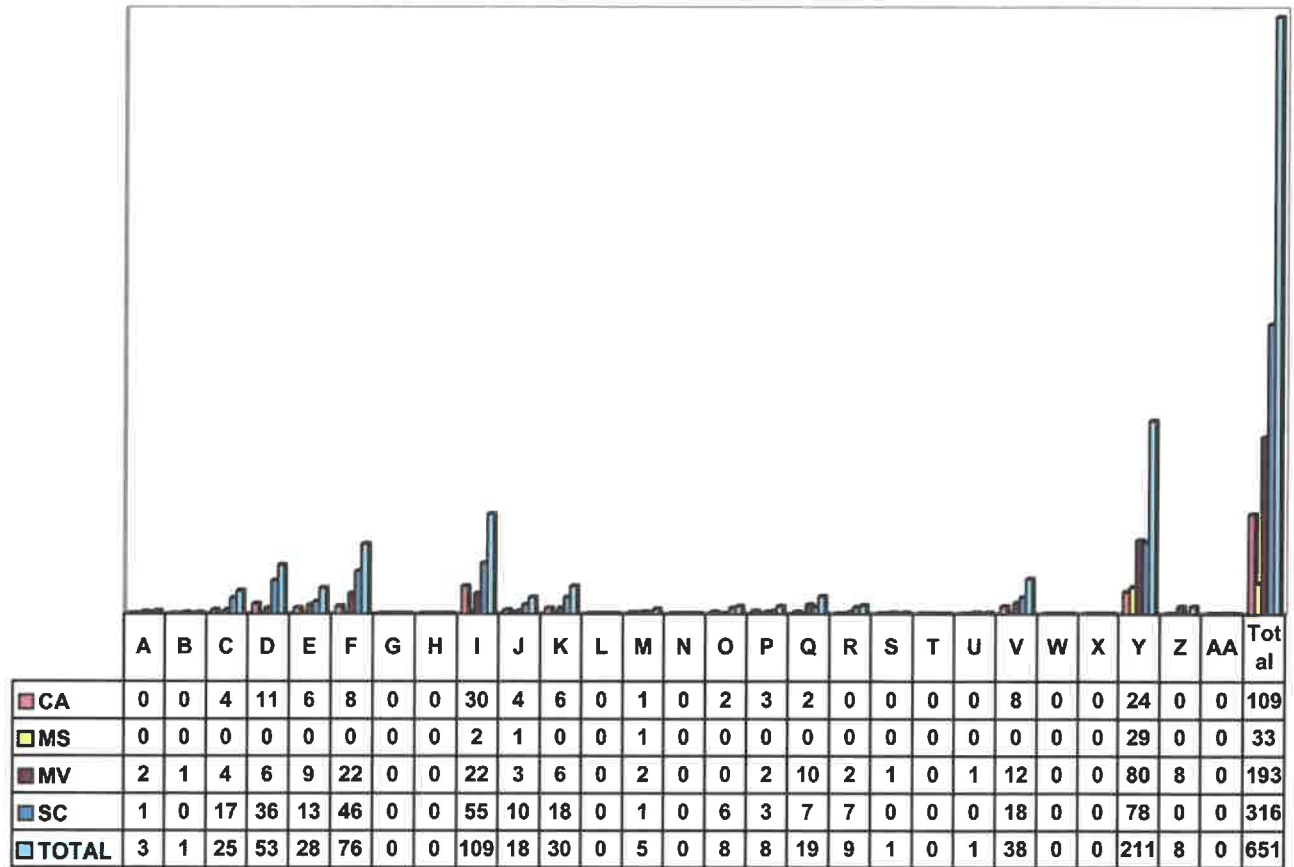

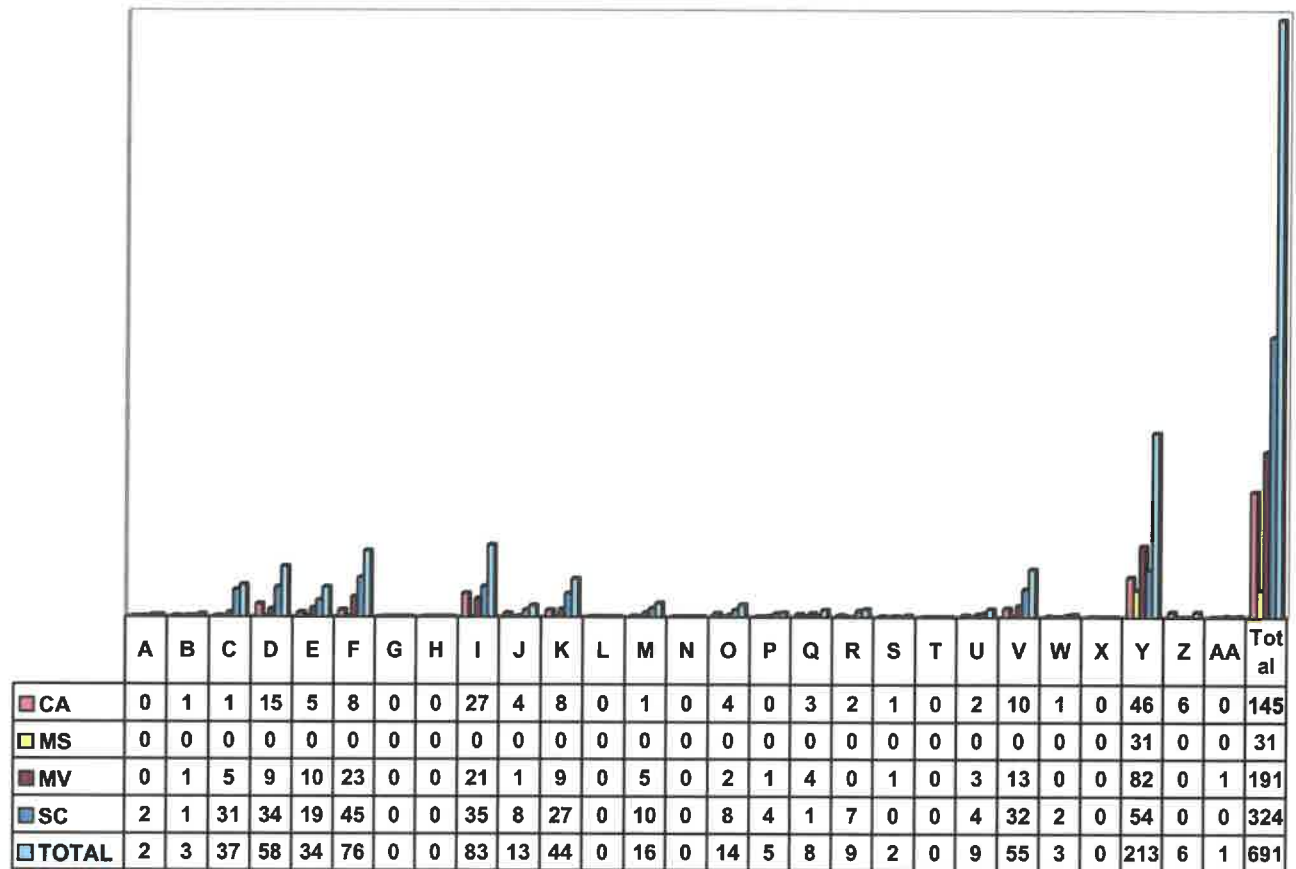
**Graph 2a. - Total Service Calls by Jurisdiction, Type and Sub-Type for March 2022**

**Graph 2b. - Total Service Calls by Jurisdiction, Type and Sub-Type for April 2022**



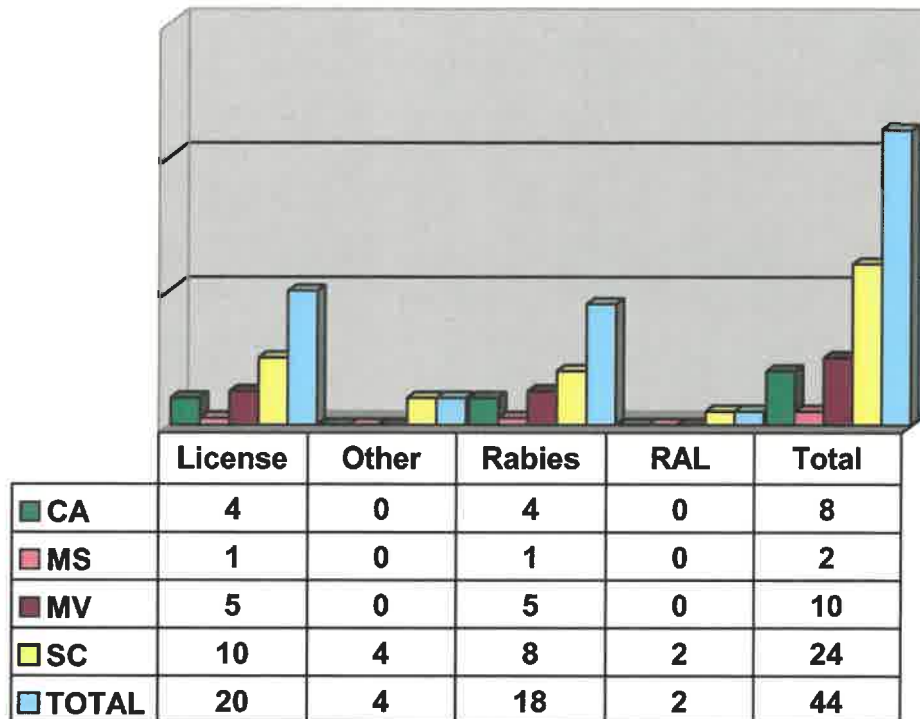

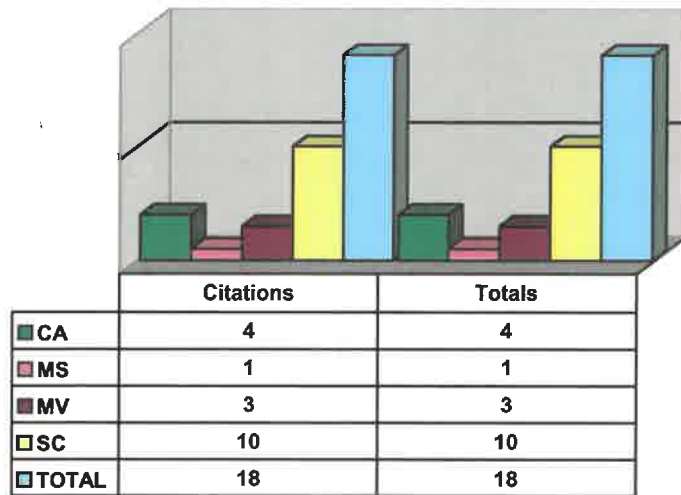

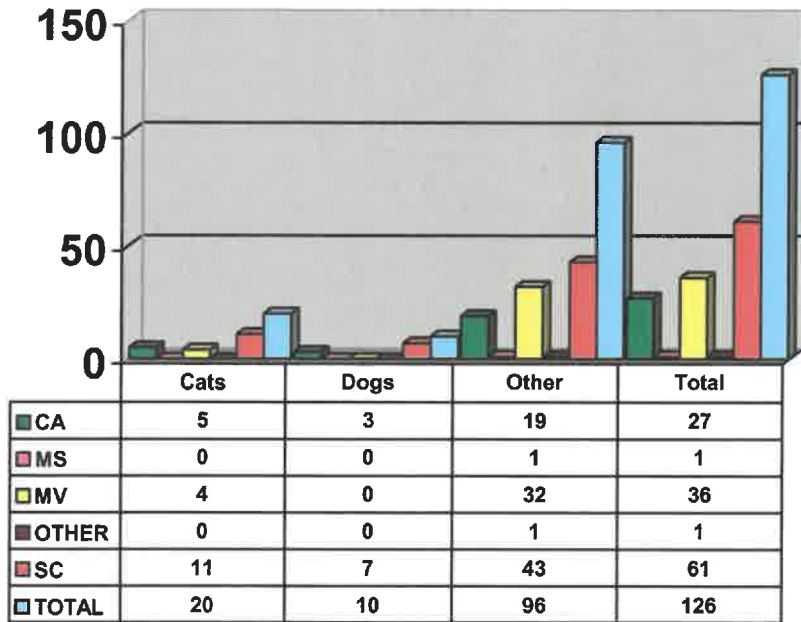

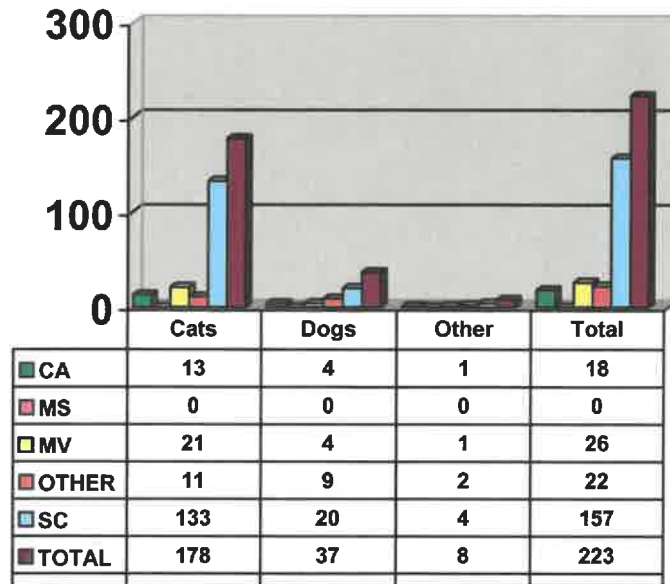

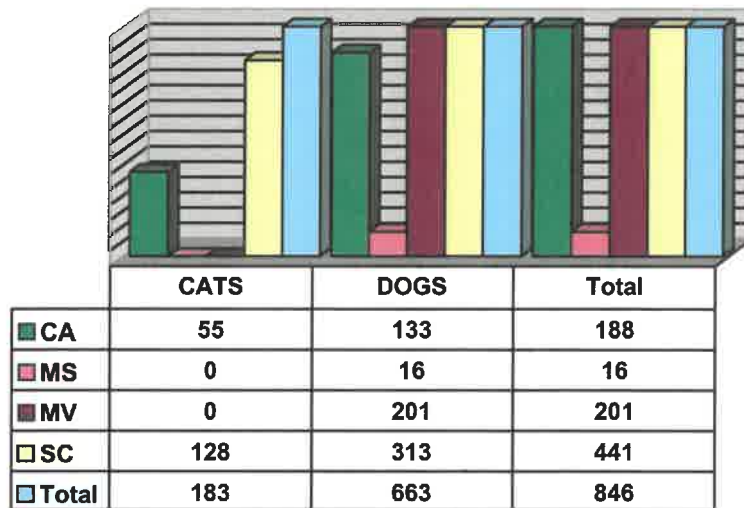

**5. Animal Outcomes**

The following tables reflect how our dogs and cats were outcomed at the center for the reporting period. The following is based on the Asilomar Accords ([www.asilomaraccords.org](http://www.asilomaraccords.org)) which were generated by animal welfare professionals as a way for agencies to accurately report a “Live Release Rate,” or how many animals had favorable outcomes. It also reports and categorizes why animals were euthanized. SVACA places all “healthy” and “treatable” animals as well as many “unhealthy” animals. SVACA’s Animal Care Center is “no kill” as we annually save greater than 90% of animals received.

**ANIMAL CARE CENTER ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND HIGHLIGHTS**

- SVACA's team continued to work through the pandemic. Unfortunately, a third team member fell ill in April. Thankfully the team member is currently doing well at the time of this report. Due to our protocols, there was no spread to others at the center.
- The community's needs continued at pre-pandemic levels as requests for services and programs once again increased.
- SVACA's Team saved 99% of our animals in March and 96% in April which kept us on pace to save 98% of all the critters in our care for 2021-22.



## OUTREACH

- Fundraising
  - We've recruited some great volunteers for Pours for Paws and we're steadily working toward garnering donations for our auctions and drawings. The team met recently at the Triton Museum to hammer out some logistics.
  - SVACA was named a beneficiary of a trust and will receive \$5,000 when the estate settles.

  - Bubba was surrendered to SVACA when his owner could no longer care for him. He was a happy-go-lucky, 70-pound pooch who thought he was a lap dog. His joyous nature and zest for life made him a staff and volunteer favorite. Bubba proved to be a smart canine too and was showing off his sits and stays like a pro. A very nice couple came in to meet with Bubba and they absolutely loved his



enthusiasm, and awesome manners, and he's now living his best life going on hikes and cuddling up at night!

### **MEDICAL TEAM**

- The following are a sampling of the good work that our medical team does day-in and out as we attempt to make sick and injured animals healthy so they can be adopted, released to a placement partner, or returned to their owner.
- Spring has sprung! SVACA's medical team was busy with kittens and community cats alike. Our foster homes are caring for kittens in need of care and special attention; some as young as 2-3 days old! These litters are not only labor intensive for the foster caregiver but the medical team is on alert working

through various ailments. It takes a village to raise these little ones to the energetic bundles you see in our adoption gallery. Our first bottle babies are still on their way to 8 weeks old, but May is seeing some of our foster kittens returning to steal hearts here at the Animal Care Center.

- Community cats have also kept the medical clinic busy treating upper respiratory infections, managing abscess wounds, removing matted portions of coats and monitoring mother cats with their litters. One such case was a large gray Domestic Shorthair from Santa Clara. Staff evaluated a neck wound in need of surgical closure. The surgery was a success, and he was able to be released back to his stomping grounds after he healed.

### **FIELD SERVICES TEAM**

- In Santa Clara, Animal Control Officer (ACO) Morris responded to a report of a cat stuck in a fence. She moved a board and rescued the cat who had a severely injured leg. Unfortunately, it was determined the leg needed to be amputated. 'Lilac' recovered in a foster home and was later adopted.
